
We were soon on a journey. A wonderful journey, in parallel with our lives. Swings and Roundabouts. Yes, that was it-Swings and Roundabouts.

August will also see a few sightings of Jack Tarr, some strangers worthy of note and a few excisemen and other characters from the past as Ballantrae rolls out Smugglers Week. I'm sure that great fun will be had by everyone and those charged will be given a fair trial and legal refreshments.

The Council has of course been in recess over the last few weeks but unlike one Councillor who was photographed with a pail and spade on Prestwick Beach, for most Councillors and certainly for me it has been carry on as usual with all of the local work that has to be attended to. It is just nice not to have to attend meetings and panels in County Buildings for a

Roads are of course always an issue and it was a controversial paper that went through Council just before the recess, recommending the setting up of a joint service provision for roads between East Ayrshire Council and South Ayrshire Council with East Ayrshire becoming the lead partner. This recommendation was based on a figure of several millions of pounds being saved over a length of five years. I voted against this proposal on a number of points. The amount of finance saved was for me purely hypothetical as there was no business case that could be shown and elected members had not been briefed on the paper. North Ayrshire who were to be part of the set up withdrew from the proposal and I believe that in the end the job security of the road workers from our town and villages could be jeopardised along with the future of the Grangestone Depot at Girvan. It was voted through and I and others will watch closely at the outcome.

It was of course great to see the fantastic new Pontoon Marina System now in place at Girvan Harbour which was officially opened in June. We are already seeing vessels such as Ocean Going Catamarans and other types of large boats which would never have visited the town before and the feedback from the crews has been very good. I look forward very much to fast progress being made with the new South Carrick Leisure Centre at Girvan Harbour which together with other improvements to the area will make such a difference to tourism and employment.

Ballantrae Church Linked With St Colmon Church

On 30th June St Colmon Church rededicated and opened their Kirk Hall after extensive refurbishment and extension. Over the past three or so years we have completed the various processes and jumped through the different hoops required to carry out this project. Having never been involved in a building project before, it has been a huge learning curve, but every struggle has been worth it as the result is far better than I could have imagined.

We started with an idea to create a more useable, accessible space which would be a valuable resource for the church and the local community, and we definitely think that this is what we now have. Before there was one main hall, a small meeting room at the back, a kitchen and one very small toilet, but now we have a hall, a sunlit room with tables and seating for 25 people, a modern kitchen, two female toilets, one male toilet, and a disabled toilet. Before the hall was accessed via steps and while the hall was mainly on one level the other rooms were slightly higher. However now the whole hall is on one level and there is disabled access to it all.


Every time I walk into it, I am amazed by the change that has taken place over the last few months. New life has indeed been breathed into a building that was tired and I am excited to see what it will be used for in the coming years.

St Colmon Parish Stained Glass (pics page 17)

The church benefits from a wide range of stained glass windows by various artists including Louis Davis, Douglas Strachan, Ballantine and Gardiner to name the ones which are signed. There are also a number of other high quality stained glass windows, artists unknown at present.

One of these is signed by a single monk which is the mark made by both J Powell and sons and also the artist James Humphries Hogan, who worked for James Powell and son.

Sir Robert Lorimer (1864-1929), Scottish architect and garden designer, had previously worked with Louis Davis (1860-1941) on several joint projects in Scotland. The McEwan family commissioned woodwork in the Church by Lorimer and it is likely that Davis obtained the commission for the windows through Lorimer. The Tryptich, the 3 main windows at the west end of the Church, are by Louis Davis.

They depict figures offering up praise including a shepherd who worked at Bardrochat and his dog, Masha, and school children representing the sons of the donor, Robert Finnie McEwen, who is portrayed as a Bishop.

The 1910 Nativity window in memory of William and Margaret McConnell is also by Louis Davis.

Of Davis' legacy, it was said: "His colour and design satisfy the sense of beauty, and the actual craftsmanship will always be a wonder to those who understand the art of glass-making."

South Ayrshire Council has been awarded £800,000 of Scottish Government funds to improve the energy efficiency of older, hard-to-treat properties that are owned or privately rented.

The Energy Agency has been appointed the Managing Agent to run the scheme. The Scheme is adopting a whole house approach with the priority primary measure of free solid wall insulation or cavity wall insulation, depending on the wall type.

There are also a wide range of secondary measures available (subject to available funding) including room in roof or underfloor insulation, heating systems and renewables to ensure each home becomes as energy efficient as possible and can make greater savings.

To qualify you must live in an area off the mains-gas network and in Council Tax band A or B or be in receipt of a qualifying benefit.

Update On The South Ayrshire Local Development Plan

As reported in the Summer edition of this magazine, the Proposed Local Development Plan has been submitted to Scottish Ministers for approval. The press release by Ms. Cheryl Downie, Communications Officer of SAC, stated that 881 responses had been received and

"There then followed a significant amount of work comparing the responses against the evidence for the Plan to ensure that there was no reason to modify it. I am pleased to say that the Proposed South Ayrshire Local Plan is one of the first such Plans in Scotland to reach this key milestone."

The South Ayrshire Council website states:

"South Ayrshire Local Development Plan"

At a meeting of South Ayrshire Council on 25th April 2013, the South Ayrshire Proposed Local Development Plan has been approved for submission to Scottish Ministers. The Plan was built on significant engagement with local communities and approved last year by Council. During the autumn of 2012, representations were invited from the community and interested persons and 881 responses were received from members of the public, the development industry and technical consultees. Following this, the Council reviewed all representations, concluding that there are no grounds to make significant changes to the Plan. The Plan will now be prepared for submission to Scottish Ministers for examination, which will take between June and December 2013. It is anticipated that the South Ayrshire Local Development Plan will be adopted in 2014."

The report on the Plan has now been released and these are the extracts pertaining to the BAL1 development proposed for Ballantrae:

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South Ayrshire Council, Report on the Proposed Local Development Plan, 25 April 2013

"para 4.2 (proposals)"

881 representations were received in relation to the Proposed LDP. These have been considered in detail within the context of the evidence and consultation that underpinned the Proposed Plan, and the conclusion reached that there is no planning justification to make significant modification to the Proposed LDP. The summary of representations is attached to this report as Appendix 1."

note: the 881 representations were the total for the whole of South Ayrshire. We believe that only approximately 190 of these were from Ballantrae although this figure does not seem to feature in the report.

Extract from Appendix 1 - Representations and Responses

"Representation Issue"

Ballantrae Housing Site @ Main Street (BAL1)

Summary - Housing Issues

Object to BAL1 on following grounds: no need for housing/development at Ballantrae; there are existing vacant houses in Ballantrae; development will have an adverse impact on road safety and congestion in village and there is already poor public transport links; site release conflicts with rural diversification, dark skies and G&A Biosphere objectives; development would be contrary to Transport Scotland's objective to reduce trunk road impact on communities; the plan in the LDP is incorrect, and some areas should be removed, due to ownership; no community council support

for site; agricultural land should be retained to improve carbon footprint and for food production; consultation processes have been poor; development will result in loss of privacy for existing houses; development will fragment village; there are poor employment opportunities for future residents; existing local amenities cannot sustain further housing; development will result in a loss of wildlife; new housing will change village dynamic. Other comments queried whether alternative site(s) may be available, and that there is a need for affordable housing.

Consideration

As part of the 'call for sites' exercise, a site was proposed by Ballantrae Community Council, indicating that there is a demand for housing within the settlement. Impacts upon the local road network will be addressed to the satisfaction of the Council's Roads service and/or Transport Scotland as part of the planning application process, alleviating safety and congestion concerns.

The site is not located within the dark skies park and is located within the 'transition area' of the Biosphere. Within this area the principles of sustainable development are promoted. It is considered that development within an existing settlement would be inkeeping with the fundamental principles of sustainable development.

The loss of agricultural land was considered within the site report, concluding that most of the land around Ballantrae is PQAL and it would therefore be difficult to provide for a logical extension to the settlement without encroaching upon PQAL. It is considered that the consultation exercises have been more than sufficient, ensuring that interested parties have had opportunities to submit their concerns to the Council within reasonable timeframes.

The allocation of the site, in principle, will not result in an unacceptable loss of privacy for any existing dwellinghouse. A planning application for the development of the site would determine whether specific development proposals for the site would

meet the Council's established residential amenity standards, thereby ensuring maintenance of an appropriate level of privacy/residential amenity for existing houses. In terms of the fragmentation of the village, it is considered that the site presents the most logical option for the extension of the settlement and that there are opportunities to integrate with the existing settlement.

There is no definitive information to suggest that there would be poor employment opportunities for future residents or indeed, that future residents would require employment opportunities. In terms of existing local amenities, additional housing would provide a small boost to the local economy. If it generated capacity issues at the school, the developer would be required to provide a solution to this as part of the planning application process, in line with the Council's Education Contributions policy and associated SG

The loss of wildlife is not considered to be an issue of concern in relation to this site. It is not a wildlife site and SNH have not offered any objection to the site.

Changing the dynamic of the village is not a material planning consideration.

The site will be required to make an affordable housing contribution in line with LDP policy: affordable housing – though this may or may not result in affordable housing on site.

The circumstances of this site are unique in that the Community Council and landowner both submitted the site for the Council's consideration, and that since publication of the proposed Plan, the community support for the site has been withdrawn.

I was pleased to be present at the opening of the Ballantrae Development Groups Visitor Information Point on Tuesday the 6 August based in Craigie Mains Garden Centre. This is a terrific innovation and I hope this can be a model which can be taken up throughout Carrick in support of the wider Carrick Tourism Project. There is no doubt given recent experience Carrick has to make its own way in the wider Ayrshire and Visit Scotland Tourism market as there is so much to offer in this area for a different kind of visitor experience.

Another attraction I am delighted to see, are red squirrels being promoted and protected in Pinwherry/Pinmore with the new signs as part of the Heritage Hub Trail, another innovation of the Carrick Community Council Forum's Tourism Project. I note progress is being made with plans for the Two Pins Centre in Pinwherry and I wish it every success. This could be a lasting legacy and benefit from the Windfarms in the area which I know is a very controversial subject but the turbines are in place for the next 20 years or more and the maximum benefit must be gained from them being in South Carrick.

Another success story is the tidying up of several walks around Dailly and Barr in conjunction with the Council and Forestry Commission. Also I am pleased to see the Ayrshire Alps Cycling Festival hosted by the Ayr Roads Cycling Club which is being held on Saturday 17 and Sunday 18 August throughout Carrick, which proves that here in Carrick we have walking

It was good to see the start of Maw Broons After Noon Tea in Barr over the summer period and the reopening of the Kings Arms Village Pub. Barr is buzzing at the moment with a new influx of enthusiastic Community Council members keen to get actively involved in improving village life.

On Monday the 22 July, I attended a meeting with Councillor Alec Clark of the Barrhill Community Interest Company. We were ably assisted by Gavin McEwan of Turcan Connell Solicitors. This was in order to verify the voting procedure used to elect the new board of the Barrhill CIC and I am pleased to report this all went smoothly. I congratulate the new board and wish them and the Barrhill CIC every success in the future.

I also attended the opening of the new pontoons at Girvan Harbour on Friday the 21 June. This is another good news story in the regeneration of Girvan and South Carrick, begun under the previous Council Administration, funded by the European Union, Scottish Enterprise and South Ayrshire Council. Part of the event was the launch of the skiff "Creag Ealasaid" constructed by pupils and staff of Girvan Academy. I understand there are plans to compete with other skiffs and crews from Maybole and Troon in the new pastime of coastal rowing.

Finally, I am pleased to report that a final design for the new swimming pool and all purpose facility at Girvan Harbour has been agreed. 

BALLANTRAE BUSINESS



Our Service was established on 1st April 2013, bringing together the collective skills and experience from across Scotland's previous eight fire and rescue services. You may think that our role is pretty straightforward – to prevent and control fires but, as any of our 8,000 firefighters will tell you, there's much more to the job than that.

The best way to deal with an emergency is to prevent it from happening in the first place, and our role starts long before any 999 call is made. We work in close partnership with local communities' right across Scotland to deliver crucial safety messages in the fight against fire. Whether based in an office or in a fire station, in the centre of Aberdeen or the wilds of Argyll, our staff are working together for a safer Scotland.

As with all emergency services, we are ready and available for action every minute of each day and on every day of the year - fires and disasters do not stop because of holidays or bad weather, and nor do we. Our wholetime firefighters respond to 999 emergency calls and tackle a wide range of incidents from fires and Road Traffic Collisions to chemical spills and water rescues. Wholetime firefighters also work with local communities to help keep people safe and spend much of their time engaging the public and our partners in the fight against fire. Our retained and volunteer staff are part-time firefighters who provide a vital service to our smaller or more rural communities; most of them are women and men whose primary employment is in another field, but who deliver the same range of emergency service as their wholetime colleagues.

It is essential that your home has a working smoke alarm on each level of the property. If a fire starts, this will give you and your family time to get to safety.

Doors slow down the spread of potentially deadly smoke and flames, so it is important to remember to close them at night.

Fire often starts in the kitchen and no-one should ever leave a cooker unattended while it is in use. It is also important to stay with any lit candles and make sure they are kept away from children and pets, and from curtains or other flammable materials.

Home Fire Safety Visits

It's important to know how to reduce the chances of fire happening in your home and, if it does, how to protect yourself. Every hour of every day there's a house fire in Scotland. Cooking accidents, overloaded sockets, faulty appliances, smoking and drinking are just some of the reasons why there are so many house fires in Scotland. One lapse, such as leaving a pan unattended or failing to put out a cigarette properly, could change your life forever.

Electrical Safety

Switch off and unplug appliances like TVs, washing machines and tumble dryers that aren't designed to be left switched on. It's especially important when you're sleeping, or out of the house. Switching off at the socket and pulling the plug out is the only way to be sure no electricity is flowing through an appliance. Just using the socket switch isn't safe because the switch could be faulty. As well as keeping you safer, switching off and unplugging things at the wall saves you electricity and money! Appliances like fridge-freezers, videos with timers and cordless phones are designed to be left on.



Cooking & Alcohol: A Recipe For Disaster

If you've been drinking alcohol or taking drugs, don't cook. If you're not concentrating, cooking the simplest meal can cause a fire. It's easy to be distracted when cooking. It's easy for a cooking fire start. Never walk away while you're cooking.



Key Tips

The best way to avoid having a fire involving hot oil is to use a thermostat controlled, electric deep-fat fryer.

- Never throw water over a pan that is on fire.
- If you've been drinking alcohol or taking drugs, don't cook.
- Take extra care if you suffer from any illness, disability or are taking prescribed medications that make you careless or forgetful.
- Keep grill pans clean.
- Fires start when your attention stops.
- Never walk away while you're cooking.

In the event of fire, a smoke or heat alarm will alert you and give you time to react safely and sensibly. Make sure you have working smoke alarms. Consider fitting a heat alarm in your kitchen. Cooking is the biggest cause of house fires in Scotland.

A short visit from the Fire and Rescue Service will help make sure your home is as safe as it can be. They can install smoke alarms, free, if you need them. The highlights of the week will have been the interactive "Court of Justice" - which is expected to throw up a few scandalous surprises, the Fun Day and Village Fayre on the Saturday where the captured smugglers will be punished and the Folk Night organised Girvan Folk Club will have rounded off the Festival.

New Visitor Information Point for Ballantrae



The Ballantrae Development Group (BDG) - a sub group of the Ballantrae Community Council - has been working with Craigiemains Home and Garden Centre to establish a Visitor Information Point (VIP) within Craigiemains; funded by Carrick Futures.

The Visitor Information Point, which was designed and built by BDG members Peter Newland and Andy McAlpine, contains a video loop of pictures of Ballantrae and the surrounding area, leaflets of things to see and do within roughly a 30ml radius of the village, a map of the village (see centre colour pages) and features a stunning carving of a salmon created by local craftsman Ross McCreadie.

BDG member Andy McAlpine said: "Ballantrae is serious about attracting visitors to the village. That is why we have contributed to the Ayrshire and Arran Tourism Strategy, the Carrick Tourism Strategy and the "Carriack Characters and Heritage Hubs" project. Ballantrae is the gateway to Carrick. Rather than engaging a private company to supply us with a range of leaflets - many of which would have no bearing on what is happening locally - we decided to approach businesses and attractions within roughly a 30 ml radius of Ballantrae ourselves, to target the things we thought visitors and locals might want to see or do on a day out. The reaction to that approach has been quite remarkable. There's no doubt there is a lot happening in the South West of Scotland - whether it is in South Ayrshire or Dumfries and Galloway and we are happy to showcase these places, activities and events."

Although the VIP was open in time for the main tourist season, it was officially opened on 6 August by Moira Birtwhistle, Chair of the Ayrshire and Arran Tourism Leadership Group who said:

"Rural communities are the lifeblood of Ayrshire & Arran, reflecting the rich cultural heritage of our land and people.

Ballantrae Community Council and the Ballantrae Development Group have truly embraced tourism, recognising that any development should be sustainable, drawing on their cultural heritage to create a sense of place and recognising how "local food' can add value to the visitor and tourist experience. The energy here is tangible and exemplar.

Ballantrae Development Group's enterprising approach to collecting information by engaging with businesses, organisations and attractions within a radius of 30 miles, has ensured a refreshing approach to showcasing and encouraging both visitors and locals to explore the delights of the area, and stimulating the local visitor economy.

I thoroughly enjoyed my visit to Ballantrae today and recognise and commend all your hard effort in delivering innovative tourism projects. Congratulations on making a difference and realising your shared vision"





Community Transport

The key conclusion of a report by the Scottish Parliaments Infrastructure and Capital Investment Committee of which I am the Deputy Convener is that funding should be available to help community transport providers buy new and replacement vehicles.

The Committee has been examining the problems community transport users and providers in Scotland face. The local area has been served reasonably well over the years by a number of groups including Ballantrae Rural Initiative Care in the Community Ltd and the services offered by Carrick Community Transport Group.

However, local groups such as Stepping Stones for Families have fallen victim to a shortfall in adequate funding and the future of the community transport service operated by SAYLSA could be jeopardised with their funding application rejected by South Ayrshire Council.

Community transport services typically grow in response to local demand and need. This organic nature is vital to their success. It is essential that the services remain managed at a local level to reflect the wide variation in needs and challenges which exist in different communities and our Committee is calling on the Scottish Government to consider the best way to assist this vital service.

Crime Drop

The latest official crime statistics show a nationwide record low in recorded crime since 1974.

In South Ayrshire we have seen a 30% decrease in recorded crimes since 2007. In the past year alone there has been a 14% drop in housebreakings and crimes including vandalism and fire-raising have been more than halved since the SNP came to government in 2007.

This drop in crime is good news for local communities across the country and further evidence that the SNP is moving Scotland forward as a safer country in which to live, work and raise a family.

This is backed by record numbers of police officers – over 1,000 extra since 2007 – who are keeping communities safe and increasing the crime clear-up rate to its highest since 1976.

People are feeling safer in their communities and record police numbers underline how decisions for Scotland are best made by those elected by the people of Scotland, rather than leaving matters in the hands of Westminster politicians.

On another note I await the outcome of the review of opening times of police stations - an issue I am well aware is of local concern in Girvan.

Dear Editor,

Further to Mr Ingram's article on the new wind farm planning guidance: these are the proposals from the same Scottish government that routinely overturns decisions by local councils to reject wind farm planning applications on the same grounds as those set out in the new guidance. How crazy is that! Maybe South West Scotland isn't considered wild enough? Possibly this new crisis of conscience only applies to the "real Highlands" where really influential people with lots of money and large tracts of land hold sway.

Meanwhile, here in the south west, we are discovering the reality of living with about 25% of the number of proposed wind farms for the area - the damage to property and roads during the construction phase - the only local jobs catering for the Spanish construction workers.

Then there is the effect on local wildlife. The large birds are unable to hunt because the windmills disrupt the thermals. They move into the territory of others overcrowding the habitat. Consequently small bird and rodent numbers decrease. breeding is abandoned. e.g. barn owls which have bred regularly for years have not reared young this year. Where I live - 3 miles from Barrhill - things got so bad in June and July that all the large birds deserted the area in search of food. My cats were reduced to presenting me with the same dead mouse daily for at least a week.

At the current rate of windfarm expansion the destruction of habitat will result in a total imbalance of the local wildlife with many important species being lost to the area. The only tourists will be study groups looking at how things should NOT be done.

Scotland Signs Faster Broadband Project With BT

Some 600,000 properties across Scotland are set to benefit from a massive investment in fibre broadband. The contract between BT and the Scottish Government was signed at the BT exchange in Pitt Street, Glasgow today and means that there will be a £264 million investment in broadband improvements. This is in addition to the £146 million previously announced back in March 2013 for the Highlands and Islands.

"Today's announcement signals the start of one of the most ambitious infrastructure projects in the whole of Europe. It will connect communities across rural and urban areas, providing a platform for future economic development and regeneration. "Next generation broadband enables businesses to compete on the international stage. It has the potential to transform the way in which we educate our children, provide health and social care and deliver our public services. It provides Scotland with a platform upon which we can build and sustain a world class digital country."

The contribution made by BT is £106.7 million and £50 million from the Westminster run BDUK fund and has targets of 85% coverage of fibre based broadband (mainly FTTC/ VDSL2) by the end of 2015 and increasing to 95% by the end of 2017. The total investment in better broadband across Scotland stands at £410m and builds on the commercial roll-out by BT that is already available to some 1.5 million premises in Scotland. While the expense looks high when you consider that Analysys Mason estimate £2 billion of economic benefits over a fifteen year period it looks more like a good medium to long term investment.

The areas covered by this latest announcement are Aberdeen City, Aberdeenshire, Angus, parts of Argyll & Bute, Clackmannanshire, Dumfries& Galloway, Dundee City, East Ayrshire, East Dunbartonshire, East Lothian, East Renfrewshire, City of Edinburgh, Falkirk, Fife, Glasgow City, Inverclyde, Midlothian, North Ayrshire (apart from the Islands), North Lanarkshire, Perth& Kinross, Renfrewshire, Scottish Borders, South Ayrshire, South Lanarkshire, Stirling, West Dunbartonshire, West Lothian.

The Highlands and Islands project covers Highland, Moray, Orkney Islands, Shetland Islands, Eilean Siar (Western Isles), parts of Argyll and Bute and part of North Ayrshire (Islands) and by running separately has more scope for handling the more diverse requirements of those areas.

For suspicious articles found on any beach contact the police on 999 and ask for the Coast Guard because it might have come from Beaufort's Dyke; which is the sea trench between Northern Ireland and Scotland within the North Channel. The dyke is 50 km long, 3.5 km wide and 200-300 metres deep. Because of its depth and its proximity to the Cairnryan military port, it became the United Kingdom's largest offshore dump site for conventional and chemical munitions after the Second World War; in July 1945, 14,500 tons of 5-inch artillery rockets filled with phosgene were dumped in Beaufort's Dyke. Munitions have subsequently been washed up on beaches in the area. In particular, in 1995, incendiary devices were discovered on the Scottish and Northern Irish coasts.

It is hoped that this will form the first phase in forming more creative connections and interest with our local Trails and points of interest around Barr, i.e. each point of the timepiece will relate to one of the Trails e.g. Kirsty's Cairn, the Devil's Trail, Fairy Knowe, Dinmurchie and more.
