FESTIVAL OF FOOD & DRINK

The first Ballantrae Festival of Food & Drink, held at Ballantrae Harbour on Sunday 10 May – organised by the Development Group and friends, far exceeded the expectations of the organisers and has been judged a great success by locals and visitors. Organisers had hoped for around 2000 people but during the course of the afternoon nearly 4000 people attended the festival

- some standing in a queue for over half an hour on a very windy day, because the huge marquee was at capacity and organisers had to operate a "one in one out" policy.

Stalls offering fresh quality local food all did a roaring trade. Writer and broadcaster, Kirsty Wark, foraging expert Mark Williams, local cook Susan Crosthwaite, Trump Turnberry's Executive Chef Munur Kara and Andrew Beattie of the Cook School Scotland all demonstrated their cooking skills using local produce. Live music was provided by the Pulse Jazz Combo. Pop-up restaurants provided by Glenapp Castle, Marrbury Smokehouse and Drumbreddan Hog Roast served hundreds of meals over the day.





The festival fitted the Ballantrae Development Group's 3 key aims of supporting local business, encouraging tourism and organising unique events for locals, surrounding communities and visitors. An additional reason for organising the Festival was to ensure Ballantrae Farmers' Markets continue to be sustainable in the future. As 2015 is "The Year of Food and Drink", the Development Group (a sub group of the Ballantrae Community Council) wanted to do something special to highlight the association our area has with high quality food and drink so they sought support from the Community Food Fund and South Ayrshire Council for funds that were only available in 2015 for events like this. Despite tough competition they were successful.

The Development Group's thanks go to Susan Crosthwaite and her team of volunteers and all of the festival's partners, stallholders and pop-up restaurants for a truly amazing event.



The Ballantrae Development Group (a sub group of the Community Council) will be holding its second Farmers' Market of the year on Sunday 4 October from 11am to 3pm in the grounds of Craigiemains Home and Garden Centre, Main Street Ballantrae.

Continuing to build on the very successful Ballantrae Festival of Food & Drink held in May, this market will include a wide range of food and drink for tasting and to buy.

Ballantrae Library serves the village and the surrounding area. Following its' recent makeover we asked the librarian Heather O'Hare to tell us about the services the library provides:

Q. How often do you get new books?

HO. New books are delivered almost every week, barring outside circumstances eg holidays or van breakdowns.

Q. If I see a book publicised in a magazine and I would like to read it, can you order it for me?

HO. I can order any book from other South Ayrshire libraries; some will be delivered within a week, but new and high demand books may take longer.

Q. What sort of books are most popular in Ballantrae?

HO. Crime is always popular, with general fiction a close second.

Q. Apart from loaning books, what other services can you provide?

HO. Ballantrae Library has a new computer/scanner/printer for public use, which can be reserved by telephone. Normal allowance is 2 hours daily. The building also has free Wi-Fi. Library members can download ebooks and emags, and have access to worldwide newspaper publications. All South Ayrshire libraries offer free access to ancestry.com, Carnegie Library in Ayr also offers free access to find my past and reduced price vouchers for Scotland's People for use at home. In addition, we do our best to answer any questions on local history and can usually point you in the right direction.

Q. We hear that you have recently been renovated - what did this entail and how will this improve your service?

HO. The building was totally renovated, which means we have new shelving, new flooring and new furniture. The interior walls and doors have been painted, which has made the room much lighter and fresher. The seating area has comfortable chairs, which we hope will encourage people to linger, perhaps with a newspaper.

Q. What are your opening hours?

HO. Our hours are Monday 3.30pm-7 pm; Tuesday 2.30pm-5 pm; Thursday & Friday 10am-12 noon.

Q. You have a lot of space on your shelves, why?

HO. We find that books are better displayed when there is room to see them properly, and they can be easily removed from shelves. As long as stock is turned round regularly, with new books for loan, we feel that is what customers want.

Q. Do you have any special events coming up?

HO. By the time this goes to print, we hope to have been very much involved with the Ballantrae Smugglers' Festival. Smuggling books have been delivered and displayed in the library and we will have had a presence at the Smugglers Children's Day on 17 August.

Now you have read all about Ballantrae Library please drop in and see it for yourself. You'll find it next to the Community Centre. Heather looks forward to seeing you.

BALLANTRAE SMUGGLERS FESTIVAL

Smuggler Scarecrow making and short stories

Once again the children of Ballantrae and Colmonell Primary Schools had great fun helping to make Smuggler Scarecrows for this year's festival. These were displayed during Ballantrae Gala Week and also in the Exhibition in the McKechnie in Girvan. In addition we received over 100 short stories including "wee story books" from the children in both schools for our Short Story Competition. A truly outstanding effort – well done – and all linked to the curriculum!





Lendalfoot residents outraged!

A group of smugglers from Ballantrae made their way to Lendalfoot in July to deliver a consignment of contraband to the locals. But after their visit it seems some of the promised brandy had gone missing.

One of the themes of this year's Ballantrae Smugglers' Festival was about where the contraband brought in by boat to Ballantrae went after it was landed. One community that definitely benefited was Lendalfoot – a fact reinforced in the song "Smuggler" recorded by the McCalmans folk group. So the organisers of this year's festival decided to re-enact the delivery of the contraband from Ballantrae to Lendalfoot in the run up to this year's festival. Pushing a barrow groaning with contraband and protected by fierce looking guards wielding heavy clubs, the motley crew arrived at the village hall under cover of a darkening sky and a light drizzle.

Andy McAlpine, who is a member of the Ballantrae Smugglers' Festival organising group and who led the crew of Smugglers for the delivery to Lendalfoot said "The community had put in an order for tea, salt, tobacco, brandy and fine wines from France. They sampled the salt and expressed themselves content with the quality, but the men only seemed interested in the drink. After a price was negotiated and paid, the wine was opened. But despite a whip round they didn't have enough to pay for the brandy so that's now on its way to another customer!"

Isabel Melville of the Lendalfoot Community Association who helped organise the event (and who it is rumoured actually ordered the delivery of contraband) said "We were pleased to welcome the smugglers from Ballantrae as our stocks were getting low. They arrived with a police escort with blue flashing lights - they must have paid them off! They showed us a film of last year's festival and told us of their plans for this year and suggested ways in which we could become involved. Then they gave us the opportunity to sample the contraband on offer and we expressed ourselves content with the quality. Their leader was very plausible but after they left we noticed that the brandy was missing. We are outraged.....!"

Our thanks go to The Lendalfoot Community for entering into the spirit of the event and for a great evening.



Ballantrae Smugglers Exhibition in the McKechnie Institute, Girvan

Our thanks go to South Ayrshire Council and the staff at the McKechnie for agreeing to host an exhibition in the McKechnie from 22 July until 1 August. This was the scene that greeted you;



"The year is 1814 and Alexander Coulter senior of Ballantrae is sitting at a table with a map of Ballantrae and the surrounding coastline set out in front of him. Also on the table are a small bottle of brandy (half empty) and a pistol – both within easy reach. Around the table are his sons. Together they are planning the next delivery of salt, tobacco, tea, brandy and fine wines from France. In the middle of the table is a replica of the kind of ship that he is hoping will bring his next shipment of contraband. In the background are a number of the villagers ready to help unload the cargo when it arrives on Ballantrae beach. But who's that in the corner?

It seems his eyes follow your every movement..... On the walls are posters and storyboards

telling Ballantrae's Smuggling Story and elsewhere in the room you will find books that tell that story – one of them written by the children of Ballantrae and Colmonell Primary Schools. A short video loop plays the highlights of last year's Ballantrae Smugglers' Festival. The pictures from the Muir Collection add atmosphere to the room."

INFLATABLE MARQUEE ARRIVES

The long-awaited Ballantrae inflatable marquee has arrived. It is 12m long by 7.3m wide (that's 40ft x 24ft if you're as old as me) and, with plenty of headroom, feels very spacious.

from the archives . . .

snippets of local history gathered from newspapers, the British Library Archives and many local sources by Keith and Christine Brown of Ballantrae.

The 1920's and 1930's were a busy time in the Ballantrae area.

Unveiling took place of the Ballantrae War Memorial by Mrs Hughes Onslow CBE of Laggan and the dedication service was performed by the Rev JH Baxter Ballantrae Minister, Rev Robert Steen UF Minister and the Rev Ewen MacGregor of Glenapp.

First assembly of the Ballantrae Christian Brethren meets in Ballantrae

The New Public Hall was built in Ballantrae and Glenapp Church was restored.

Electricity was installed in Ballantrae Parish Church as well as the fitting of a toilet in the Vestry.

Following the Church amalgamation The Free Church Manse was sold to the Inspector of the Poor for £625. Three years later the Free Kirk building was sold for £65 to a building firm from Cumnock to be demolished.

The last of the Bargany Kennedy family left Finnarts House when it was purchased by the Earl of Inchcape.

Coal boat XL from IOM sailing to Kilkeel from Ayr sinks 2 miles North of Ballantrae. The crew got into a small boat and managed to row to Ballantrae Coastguard Station where their 'needs' were supplied by the local agent for the Shipwreck Mariner's Society.

The Earl of Stair intimated he was prepared to give a 5 year lease of a field adjacent to the village free of charge as a Recreation Ground. The Council agreed to equip the field for £60.

Basking shark caught in a net in Lendal Bay by Ballantrae fishermen Robert & Tom McQuiston (salmon fishers).

Ayr Council agree to buy the Toll House with a view to demolish it to make way for a new bridge.

In 1939 Ballantrae village now had 7 ARP Wardens and 5 Special Constables trained on how to deal with gas in Air Raids. Colmonell village had commenced training of 12 ARP Wardens and 9 Special Constables.

Post Office announce that a Public Telephone box will be erected as soon as possible

Public inquiry was held into the proposed new bridge and road alterations. First part of the scheme to be the section from Ballantrae to Lagganholm including a proposed new bridge which was to cost £35,000.


Stinchar Valley Photo Group

BALLANTRAE CHURCH LINKED WITH ST COLMON CHURCH



When I was on holiday in July, my family and I went to Futuroscope in France. It is said to be one of the four main theme parks in France, together with Disneyland Paris, Asterix Parc and Puy du Fou, though I imagine many of you will have only heard of Disneyland Paris. Futuroscope, situated just outside Poitiers, is a technological theme park with many 3D and 4D rides and various IMAX screens.

If you have never experienced a 4D ride, it is very similar to a 3D ride, but as well as wearing 3D glasses to make your eyes believe you are in a virtual reality, they also blow air or spray water at you to make you feel you are somewhere else. For instance, on one of the rides we saw on the screen rats running towards us and the next moment, through the use of carefully timed blasts of air, it felt like the rats had just ran between our legs. Needless to say the first time you were on the ride you did get a bit of a shock.

All this works on the premise that if you see and feel something, then your brain begins to feel that you are somewhere completely different. I guess at times in our lives many of us would happily switch on a system and be instantly transported somewhere else, far from our worries and concerns. We meet in BRICC House on the 2nd and 4th Mondays of each month at 7.30pm. For further information please contact Barbara Ogston on 01465 831252.





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



Cut it out then decorate the wings, leaving the 'body' bit in the middle clear

Fold down the centre line, so the decorated wings are on the outside, then fold along the diagonal lines to create a paper aeroplane type shape and tape it in place.

The decorated wings should be on the underside of the kite – this is what you'll see from the ground when it's flying :0)

Make your kite stronger by taping a twig on top, across the wingspan

Step 5


Punch out holes where the small circles on the body are, then tie a really long bit of string through - this will be what you hold on to when your Kite is flying

Dear Reader,

As I prepare this article in late July for the Autumn Edition of the Stinchar Valley Magazine, it is raining yet again, it has not been the best of summers for bright sunny weather, but hope springs eternal! In spite of poor weather, the Ballantrae Festival of Food and Drink was a huge success with over 3,000 visitors. I doubt if Ballantrae has ever seen so many people on the one day. At this point in time I am looking forward to the Smugglers Festival in August when Ballantrae will celebrate it's historical past, when times were not quite so law abiding.



I welcome the news that Colmonell is planning to form a Development Committee which will see the area benefit from Community Benefit funding matched with other sources of funding such as Ayrshire Leader the European Rural Development Fund,

which will be coming on stream in the Autumn. I was also pleased to see that Barrhill C.I.C. has been successful in creating a play park at Arnsheen, which local children and visitors can make good use of and enjoy. I am pleased also to note that the Two Pins Centre in Pinwherry is making good progress, with a decision on a major funding application due in the near future. I wish this project every success.

In this time of increasing austerity it is more important than ever that communities come together to make the most of any funding from whatever source, in order to improve the local area or community. To that end I welcome the Community Empowerment Bill which was passed by the Scottish Parliament in June.

The Bill will give groups of people, more powers to take over land, buildings and services, so that Communities which have abandoned buildings, or derelict land blighting an area, can identify the best ways to make improvements and take forward regeneration on their own terms. Further details can be obtained on the Scottish Government Web Site.

Another piece of Scottish Government legislation taking shape is the Integration of Health and Social Care, which was inaugurated in April this year, this new legislation aims to dove tail Health and Social Care into one body, which is designed to be more effective in delivering local health care by creating Locality Planning Groups, which any one can be a part of. For more information please contact Dawn.parker@south-ayrshire.gov.uk. Dawn covers the Girvan and South Carrick villages and she would be delighted to hear from anyone who would like to be part of the Girvan and South Carrick Locality Planning Group.

Another issue of importance taking place is the Fifth Review of Local Government Electoral Arrangements, which is open for consultation to individuals and Community Councils. The Local Government Boundary Commission welcomes comments and suggestions and the Public Consultation Phase takes place between the 30th. of July until the 22nd of October, this is your opportunity to have your say on this important piece of legislation. Details can be found at www.lgbc-scotland.gov.uk

Finally I welcome the improvements to the A714 between Girvan and the Dumfries and Galloway boundary, this is long overdue and is a result of the sustained pressure from local residents and Community Councils to South Ayrshire Council, other improvements are planned over the next 4 years.

ESMÉ MAVER, FARRIER, SHALLOCHWELL: 1970-2015






Esmé died on the 19th July 2015, aged 44 years after a three year illness with a brain tumour. When Avril, her late mother bought Shallochwell (see the Stinchar Valley Magazine, Summer 2013) in 1980, Esme was just 10 years old; her sister Justine was 13 years old. Esme graduated first as a Blacksmith, then as a Farrier. She developed her practice over 16 years with clients as far afield as Ayr in the north and Wigtown in the South.
