SOUTH AYRSHIRE'S NEW RECYCLING SYSTEM 2018-19

The council are changing the way South Ayrshire recycles, with two new smaller bins being introduced between October 2018 and April 2019 to increase the amount and quality of recycling collected, while also reducing the amount of waste sent to landfill.

25,400 tonnes of waste was sent to landfill in 2017 which leads to increased costs to the public expense. At present large quantities of recyclable materials and food waste are placed in general waste bins.

To improve South Ayrshire's current household recycling rate of 52.5%, new ways of collecting materials are being put in place.

This new way introduces two new smaller bins* for 'Paper, card and cardboard', and 'Glass Bottles and Jars', while the existing blue bins will be used for 'Metals, plastics and cartons'. The new look system includes:

- *Paper, card and cardboard (new 180L GREY bin, collected every four weeks)
- *Glass Bottles and Jars (new 140L BLACK bin with PURPLE lid, collected every six weeks)
- Metals, plastics, cartons (240L BLUE bin, collected every four weeks)
- Non-recyclable waste (240L GREEN bin, collected every three weeks)
- Food waste (23L caddy, collected every week)
- Garden waste (240L BROWN bin from 46,000 households every four weeks)

Girvan will be the first area to go live in October 2018,

Every household in South Ayrshire will be sent full details of how the new service will operate, including collection calendars.



AN INDEPENDENT VIEW

What great summer weather we have enjoyed this year. As I write this column the forecast is for more hot weather. In rural parts, this of course also presents challenges for farmers with less growth in the grass for grazing animals as well as water conservation. However in general it has been welcome, especially for families with children on school holidays who can make the most of the great outdoors and our glorious coastline. There have been many great outdoor events and galas this summer that have been really enjoyed with the fine weather. It was such a happy day at the Ballantrae Gala until the sad news spread throughout the village that there had been a tragic road accident just south of Ballantrae. I am sure that the thoughts of all are with the family.

Hot or cold, our roads are always on the radar and there have literally been times this summer when the tar has been melting. The good news is that some good work has been taking place to make it easier for those using our roads. Timber Transport funding along with matching finance from South Ayrshire Council has allowed the Ayrshire Roads Alliance to carry out good work on the A714 Girvan to Newton Stewart Road with the stretch from Corwar to the D&G boundary now completed. There has been significant investment over the last few years on the A714 and I do believe that although not perfect, it is much improved. Of course the A714 is not the only route either having work completed or work yet to be carried out. This administration has managed (even with tight budget restraints) to make a real term increase in funding to our roads system. I know that it can never be enough without central government prioritising investment in the road network; however we as elected Councillors always try to support those who work on our roads system to make it the best that it can be.



As the South Ayrshire Councillor linked to the Galloway and Southern Ayrshire Biosphere, I had the pleasure a few weeks ago to attend a special awards ceremony in the Stone Barn at Culzean Castle and Country Park. This was to award the Biosphere accreditation status to local businesses who had applied and through hard work had managed to achieve the criteria required to make the grade and receive the accreditation award. Well done to the local businesses who made it and may they be the first of many. This in essence will be a mark of quality which will give assurance to those who are potential customers and a feather in the cap of those who have achieved the award. It is also a first step along the way of using the status of the Galloway and Southern Ayrshire Biosphere to put this corner of Scotland on the map. Look out for this accreditation symbol as you use local businesses.

VILLAGE WALKABOUT



A walkabout took place by some residents of Pinwherry on the 8th July. We met at the 2 Pins Field and our walk took us to the picnic tables on the B734 road to Colmonell, then back up to Pinwherry Hall, back down over the bridge to the village entry sign, and then back to 2 Pins Field. The idea was to spend a bit of time walking around the centre of the village identifying what looks good, things not so good, and suggestions for improvements.

The intention was to see our village from the eyes of the visitor as too

often we don't always notice things living in a place, sometimes we just get used to things being the way they are. The outcome of the walk has been shared with groups and organisations representing Pinmore and Pinwherry, 2 Pins Company, PPCC, Pinwherry and Pinmore Community Development Association, the Community Association and SWI.

Over the coming months we will look to see what action we can take from some of the things highlighted from the walk. A few

things that were highlighted for potential improvement were smartening up Jubilee Bridge and making it a more attractive entrance to the village from the Colmonell Road. Cleaning up the village's entrance signage, tidying up

the bus shelters, more strimming of grasses at road sidings, removal of plant growth over traffic road warning signs and painting Pinwherry Bridge.





Jolly Good Show performers played their part in Girvan's celebrations of 350 years as a Burgh of Barony.

ENCOURAGING RED SQUIRRELS

We are delighted to be able to share some pictures of wildlife in the Ballantrae area with readers of the Stinchar Valley Magazine.

Whilst primarily concerned with the preservation of Red Squirrels, our cameras occasionally get a picture of other species people rarely see. Our efforts in the area between the River Tig and Smyrton, including the woods at Glenapp Castle, have seen a significant increase in the Red Squirrel population.

We have been doing this for just over 4 years and this year, we have Red Squirrels at 14 of our 17 feeding stations, compared to only 1 four years ago.

















Upgrade of Ballantrae's Play Park and Recreation Ground

The Play Park Development Group is now working within the new Ballantrae Trust. The Trust has received charitable status which opens up many more grant funding opportunities.

The team is very keen to make the equipment available to the school for use during the day and as a result the MUGA has been chosen as one of the priorities along with installation of a Trampoline and an upgrade to the seating area.

One of the Trust's Development Officers, Chris Hanna, has been working with the Playpark Sub Group team to establish the programme of redevelopment and assist with grant applications, which to date have brought in £15,650 for the MUGA. Additional applications totalling around £70k have been submitted to various funders. Responses are awaited. Planning permission has been submitted to South Ayrshire Council and is expected by early August.

The Play Park Sub Group has also been busy carrying out local fundraising since our last update. They held an Evening of Mediumship back in May at the Kings Arms which raised over £350. Thanks go to Brian and Suzanne Stirling for allowing the event to be held at the hotel. The Sub Group also took a stall at the Ballantrae Gala and with some young helpers raised a further £131.

The team is delighted to report that they have the following funds in place: MUGA - £15,650; Trampoline - £2,000; Seating Area - £1,500; General funds - £7,076; a total of £26,226.



BALKISSOCK LODGE RECEIVES BIOSPHERE ACCOLADE

In June Balkissock Lodge B&B was awarded a Certification Mark from the Galloway and Southern Ayrshire UNESCO Biosphere "in recognition of high quality standards in delivering environmental and sustainable development benefits to the Galloway and Southern Ayrshire UNESCO Biosphere"

The award ceremony was held at Culzean Castle and speakers included Dr Beth Taylor (Chair, UK National Commission for UNESCO), John Thomson and Ed Forrest both of the GSA Biosphere. The awards were presented by Scottish Government Cabinet Secretary for Culture, Tourism and External Affairs, Fiona Hyslop (pictured on the left with Cordelia Galley of Balkissock Lodge) who fondly remembers childhood holidays in Ballantrae and splashing about in the river Stinchar.

Two other micro businesses were also awarded a certification mark: Adventure Centre for Education (ACE) based in Girvan and Salad Brew based in Borgue in Dumfries and Galloway.



This accolade makes Balkissock Lodge not only the only B&B with a biosphere certification mark in Scotland, but possibly in the whole world!


Locals Keith and Christine Brown have been collating pictures and photographs for years and they will have some of these on display.

They were all super examples of landscape gardening, each with a highly individual slant.





Annmaree Mitchell, well known to us for her work at Glenapp Castle, showed us round Balker Farm at Castle Kennedy in May. The late Lady Stair designed and tended it for many years, and her legacy of 4 acres of trees, shrubs and flowers, many of them rare in Scotland, has continued to be lovingly maintained by Annmaree and her team. Then, on June 20th we were at Woodfall Gardens at Whithorn, guests of Ross and Liz Muir, who had created a unique garden out of scrub and waste ground. We marvelled at how, apparently new to gardening, they had done it so well.

In July we were closer to home at Glendoune House, Girvan, where Mr and Mrs Briggs showed us around their estate that stretches from Coalpots Road to the railway line behind it. Planted in the mid nineteenth century, some of their rhododendrons are now the tallest and biggest in Scotland, and some of their trees are so unusual that the owners didn't know their names. Neither, we are afraid, did we! Mr Briggs modestly insisted that he wasn't really a gardener, but his reclaimed walled garden belied that. A welcoming cup of tea completed our visit.

The August 29th meeting is at Dalswinton near Dumfries where the highlight promises to be a replica of the first ever steamboat from the end of the 18th century, sailing on its loch. We look forward to that. If it lives up to the quality of the other visits it will be a fitting finale to our 2018 garden visits.

AMBITION FOR BALLANTRAE

On 27 June, the Ballantrae Trust and the South Ayrshire AMBITION Programme hosted a short workshop for existing and potential start-up businesses in Ballantrae. Andy McAlpine of the Ballantrae Trust explained that bringing AMBITION to Ballantrae was part of the Trust's aim - i.e. to support local businesses and





encourage the creation of new jobs. After a short presentation during which AMBITION'S Calum McPhail explained the various elements of the programme - the AMBITION to Achieve, Start, Grow, Employ, Invest, Inspire and Network - each of the 9 participants from the 8 local businesses which were represented, had a one-to-one with an adviser. The four people who had expressed interest but who were unable to attend on the day because of other commitments subsequently had separate discussions with AMBITION. After the event in Ballantrae, participant comments included:

"The Ambition program was explained clearly to the group with plenty of time afterwards for one on one question and answer sessions. We have arranged a date for them to visit us on site to take things to the next stage."

I felt encouraged and more confident after talking to the adviser. She liked my ideas and made some comments that made me think of new ideas for how to take things forward from here. REMEMBRANCE

This year Remembrance Sunday commemorates the centenary of the signing of the Armistice of the First World War, which came into effect on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month 1918. BARR PARISH CHURCH

It has been some time since Barr Church featured in the Stinchar Valley magazine. Like so many churches around the country Barr Parish faces difficult times with a diminishing congregation. However this has not dampened down the spirits of the minister, Rev. Ian McLachlan and his elders - Hazel, Sharon and Yvonne. They have been hard at work to fundraise for much needed refurbishments to the church building. They are also keen to explore different ways of encouraging wider community involvement.

Last Christmas a Six Lessons and Carols Service was held on the eighteenth of December. This was followed by a warm and welcoming

Watchnight Service on Christmas Eve. The local Primary school held its own Children's special Christmas service which was attended by parents, family members and friends. For the Easter service the Church was adorned with an 'Easter Tree' decorated with glittering eggs and ribbons. The School also held their own event in the church, giving a modern twist to the judicial proceedings of the Easter story.

This beautiful, rural church with its picturesque setting has been the venue for a wedding service and also more recently a special 'renewal of wedding vows ceremony.' Throughout the year there are special Communion Services held every three months on the first Sunday of the month.

Fundraising events have included a Bake Sale, a Harvest Festival Quiz (2017) and a Games Table at the Easter Sunday Teas run by Barr Community Association.

With the main part of the church newly painted the next main focus of the Board and Session is to address the remedial works required to carry out repairs and redecoration to the Church's gable end.

Barr Church has been very grateful to the General Trustees for their support in helping to fund

the main refurbishments. Additional funding streams though have needed to be identified and we are grateful to the Baird Trust and the Fergusson Bequest Fund for their promise of grants. Further funding is required to complete the repairs to ensure the building's long term future.

So there will be future fundraising events in the lead up to this year's Harvest Festival, which have been boosted by the £45 of vouchers gifted by Barr Community Shop. So a very big thank you to the shop, as well as Barr Community Association and the village community for all the support we have received over the past year or so!

Dates on forthcoming events will be published in Barr Community Shop; on the Village Hall noticeboard and at the Church.

Normal services take place every Sunday morning at twelve fifteen in Barr Parish Church to which everyone is very welcome to attend. Barr Church is also rather unusual among churches in that it is open throughout the year - seven days a week, three hundred and sixty five days a year for anyone to spend some time in it.



KILDONAN COURTYARD CLOCK TOWER










Last year we purchased a couple of the cottages within Kildonan Courtyard and became the proud part-owners of the clock tower. Sadly, the clock itself wasn't working. We have spoken to a local resident who remembers that the clock wasn't working fifty years ago. Another member of the community can remember looking across from the railway and seeing that the clock was working and the time was correct in about 1946.

On inspection it was found that most of the internal mechanism was missing. The cast iron clock faces were backed by badly damaged opal glass, and the faces were mounted within a rotten wooden frame surmounted by a wooden roof clad with lead. The clock hands were made of aluminium — a state of the art metal in 1920 when the courtyard was built, and corroded in place.



The clock faces returned looking beautiful with fresh black paint and new glass. It was an exciting three days lifting the faces back into place, installing the mechanism and attaching them to a wireless system that will ensure that the clock is always showing the correct time. LED lights were installed that will back-light the faces at night.

We hope that you will agree that this restoration has enhanced this local landmark and that everyone will enjoy seeing the clock in full working order again.
