Because of the volunteer Editorial Team's efforts, you can be sure that what goes into the pages of the Stinchar Valley Magazine is newsworthy and about our villages. 
CHRISTMAS SHOW



BRICC'S REPUTATION SPREADS

BRICC (or the Ballantrae Rural Initiative Care in the Community to give it its full name) is well known to the folk in the Stinchar Valley. One of the members of the Editorial Board spotted an article about BRICC in the publication "Our Wigtownshire" at the end of 2017. We thought it deserved to be seen by more folk in this area and so, with the permission of the editor of "Our Wigtownshire" we reprint it here.



On the outskirts of Wigtownshire, a community-run care agency aims to build a small residential facility so elderly locals in need can stay in their area. Ballantrae Rural Initiative Care in the Community (BRICC) was created 22 years ago when a public meeting expressed grave concern about the need for frail and elderly residents to move to locations away from their community, if they were in need of care. One of the founders, Rosemary Stevenson has dedicated the last 41 years of her life to help improve the village, the last 21 of which have been with BRICC. Rosemary saw the need for such a facility in Ballantrae when it came to her attention that 16 people from the village lived miles away in residential care.

The 80-year-old was on WRI duty delivering Christmas biscuits to former residents who had been shipped to different parts of the region. She saw first hand the problems that the ex-villagers faced. "When I told them I was from Ballantrae, the tears just run down their faces and they told me they wished they were back in the village," Rosemary said. "I thought why shouldn't they be back and felt dreadful for the people who were obviously isolated from the place they called home. Once you are in care away from your own area, you can lose hope and think that's the end."

A meeting was called soon after Rosemary's return and a committee was formed to see if they could assist the residents who lived miles away to return home.

The BRICC Committee of Management carried out a needs analysis covering every home in the Ballantrae Primary catchment area and covering 420 residents. The support from locals was overwhelming with 84 per cent



agreeing with the idea of care to be provided in the home. A locally-based augmented home care programme was devised. The BRICC team tried several options to get the organisation and residential facility off the ground.

Rosemary said: "We went to the Council to ask them to build a small facility in Ballantrae area so that our elderly people could stay in their own environment but were turned down. We asked private firms if they would come and build a

residential facility here. They came and said 'Yes, we hear what you're saying', but they needed 60 beds before it would make them money. We are a hinterland down here so it wouldn't work, it would only be half full.

"In Girvan, you can get 24-hour care in your own area with friends and family, everything is hunky-dory. If you are down here you might have to go to Maybole, or even Prestwick. It can have a negative impact on the person and their families."

After several knock-backs, the group decided to have a go themselves. A mission statement produced in 1995 is still the same now. They provide caring staff, domestic help and voluntary services to support the frail or elderly, or others needing care, so that they may remain in their own homes for as long as possible. Support is also on hand for carers of dependant relatives of any age group and for those in emergency situations.

To develop, in the longer term, a residential facility to cater for all the anticipated care needs of local residents the ultimate aim. It's not just Ballantrae that the group cater for, with the surrounding medical practice catchment area running to Cairnryan and Barrhill, as well as Colmonell, Pinwherry and Pinmore.

Rosemary added: "Rural villages are involved in what we are trying to do. It's not just Ballantrae, all rural villages are in the same boat. We did another questionnaire in 2006, the result was that BRICC should get on with it. Ninety-one per cent of people who responded said that we should get a move on and get this care facility up and running, that gave us the community backing. The community were behind us and thought it was a good idea."

The BRICC team endured a difficult journey to find a place to build the facility and settled at Main Street of the village.

BRICC provide 700 hours of care per week to clients in their own homes, largely through a contract with South Ayrshire Council. This provides paid employment for 38 people, 11 of which are full time. They serve 100 clients

during the year showing that there is a need for the care BRICC provide.

Another popular service is run by volunteers, who hold a social afternoon every Tuesday, known as the BRICC Club. The club has a register of 40 members with a weekly attendance of over 26 members, who very much enjoy this day-care aspect of initiative's work. The club is open to senior residents and the housebound to enjoy a social outing, some entertainment and a cup of tea – free of charge.

The club is staffed by volunteer members and BRICC transport to and from is also free of charge and made possible by the use of volunteer drivers. Notable guests have included The Krankies, who entertained members recently thanks to Shirley McCulloch winning a competition.

Rosemary believes the club, that runs every week of the year, is vitally important.

She said: "It is a hub of our community, getting people out of their homes and interacting with others is great. It is very well used and there's always something going on. Our volunteer drivers go to places throughout the Stinchar valley and Girvan to collect. It's a fantastic service that is needed in this area, as so many are isolated."



The BRICC House is also open on a Thursday as a lunch club, with two volunteer cooks, providing a homely meal and conversation again with volunteer drivers if required. Transport to hospital and other appointments is organised by BRICC and also uses this pool of drivers. This is well used by residents who would find these visits difficult to achieve otherwise.

To keep the whole organisation running, the main fundraising source is the Thrift Shop, which operates from a purpose-built



building in the grounds of the BRICC House. The shop sells recycled, donated goods and is staffed by volunteers.

The shop is hugely popular and enjoyed by young and old, and also a large number of visiting tourists. The motto for the shop is 'Don't bin it, BRICC it.' It raised an amazing £82,650 last year, their highest ever total, with an overall 19-year total of £704,988.

Rosemary said: "The Thrift Shop is tremendous, so much money is brought in from it to help running costs and get us closer to our target. We have a shop team of 50 volunteers. They enjoy it, even that in itself is a good thing. It shows the tremendous support we have from the community."

In 2016, BRICC purchased Orchardlea, a house with a large garden adjacent to the BRICC House, with the help of a £250,000 grant from the Scottish Land Fund.

The group now have planning permission to develop the site into a 16-bed residential facility and four sheltered flats. This will cost £2,000,000 and the group have raised £600,000 towards this total. The group also applied for funding from the Big Lottery Fund.

"We explained to them that the project would cost £2 million and we would raise a million ourselves," Rosemary said. "It took them a year and three months to say that we didn't have enough match funding. When the Lottery Fund turned us down we decided, that's okay, we'll go alone and get our million raised.

"This is a community project, we work together to get this over the line. When we get another £400,000, we'll head back to the Lottery Fund. Once we get the go-ahead and get this care facility, it'll be a very good day for the people of Ballantrae and the surrounding areas."

It hasn't been plain sailing for everybody at BRICC but the endless work from Rosemary and many others hasn't gone unnoticed. The former Physical Education teacher received an MBE for her tireless work in the Ballantrae community. Rosemary remains upbeat despite the Lottery funding set-back and hopes people will help the wonderful organisation achieve its primary goal.

She said: "Everything began to fit into place too easily and then we got the Lottery letter. I didn't believe it but we aren't going to be downhearted, we continue to work hard to get the funds needed. We've got to get this finished. We do need a helping hand, so, if anyone has any fundraising ideas, call."

"PLACE IN THE BIOSPHERE" NATIONAL LOTTERY INVESTMENT FOR STINCHAR VALLEY

The Southern Uplands Partnership has received a confirmed grant of £150k from the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) for the "PLACE (People Land Art Culture Environment) in the Biosphere" project. This is one of the first awards to be made in Scotland through The National Lottery's ground breaking Great Place scheme. The funding will help develop projects and collaborations centred on the place's unique culture and heritage to address issues such as poverty, employment, health and education.

PLACE in the Biosphere will be run across three contrasting landscapes within the Galloway and Southern Ayrshire UNESCO Biosphere: the Stinchar Valley; the Borgue Peninsula; and the

Wigtownshire Moors. They cover two local authority areas and were selected due to their distinctive landscape character and the desire of local communities to engage more with their local natural and cultural heritage.

Through working with artists, writers, geologists, historians, wildlife guides etc. the Biosphere team hope the project will uncover some of the hidden gems of the Biosphere and their intrinsic links with the landscape that make these areas so special.

The Galloway and Southern Ayrshire UNESCO Biosphere covers 5268 sq.km of SW Scotland. It was designated in July 2012 when it was recognised internationally as a world class environment for people and nature. The designation is recognition of the fantastic array of landscapes, wildlife, cultural heritage and learning opportunities that SW Scotland offers for communities, businesses and visitors to experience and celebrate in a sustainable way.

Biosphere Coordinator Ed Forrest said "PLACE in the Biosphere offers us a fantastic opportunity to work closely with a group of communities located in the Biosphere to identify the stories, the places, the people, and the experiences that make these individual communities so special. Through PLACE we hope communities will feel more empowered to both protect their unique heritage and to create new initiatives that celebrate it."

Commenting on the announcement, Lucy Casot, Head of the Heritage Lottery Fund in Scotland, said: "The incredible natural landscape of the Biosphere gives the place a unique identity and makes it special for the people who live there. It's the roots if you like. This scheme will show how building on those roots can have a



hugely positive impact on the local economy in terms of health, employment and education, as well as instilling community cohesion and pride. Thanks to players of The National Lottery, we are enabling a step-change in thinking, encouraging local leaders to come together and recognise that heritage is a driving force for change for Galloway and South Ayrshire."

THE BALLANTRAE TRUST

The Ballantrae Trust came into being on 16 November 2017. Already, over forty residents have joined the Trust as Ordinary Members. If you haven't joined yet, please read on. . . .

Why should I join the Trust?

Additional windfarm money is coming to Ballantrae this year and every year for some time to come (The Ballantrae Community Fund). The Trust will bid for some of that money and so members will have some influence on where and how the money is spent. If you care about the village and the community, then you really should become an Ordinary Member of the Trust and have your say.

Can anyone become an Ordinary Member?

To become an Ordinary Member with voting rights, you must be over 16 years of age and live in the Ballantrae Community Council area. Under 16's can join as Junior Members, and others (for example, people living outside the area or people with a holiday home here) who want to support what's happening in Ballantrae can join as Associate Members – but only Ordinary Members may vote.

How do I join?

What happens next?

To help establish and run the Trust, we have received funding for a part time Development Officer from Carrick Futures Community Benefit Fund. We have appointed Andrew Ward and Chris Hanna of the Creetown Initiative to provide Development Officer support to the Trust on a job-share basis for the next 6-9 months. Their main role initially will be to help us establish the Trust, recruit more members, arrange the Trust's first AGM, help us appoint the Board of Directors and identify the Trust's priorities. They will also support the Play Park and Recreation Ground Development project, and help to develop and evaluate Ballantrae's existing festivals.

At the first Annual General Meeting (AGM) in March the Ordinary Members will select a number of Directors of the Trust, all of whom must be Ordinary Members themselves. This is necessary as the Ballantrae Trust is a "Company Limited by Guarantee" and the law requires this. The Board of Directors will then elect their own Chair, Treasurer and any other office-bearers from the Board members.

We are in discussion with those groups most affected when the school takes over sole use of the Community Hall August - December when Ballantrae Primary School is being upgraded to ensure, wherever possible, those groups have access to alternative accommodation so they can continue to meet during that period.

UPGRADE OF BALLANTRAE'S PLAY PARK & RECREATION GROUND

The Play Park Development Group is working with SAC officials and councillors to ensure that the School upgrade and Play Park Development projects are run side-by-side during 2018. This should provide some opportunities for economies of scale and possibly even save some money. While the community will be responsible for raising the money for the Play Park upgrade, we want to make some of the Play Park equipment available to the school during school hours. The school have identified a Multi Use Games Area (MUGA) and "The Circuit" round the recreation ground, and "sensory panels" as their highest priority.

Working with SAC officials, we have now started to prioritise the work that needs done and are exploring breaking the play park upgrade into the following phases:

- · Identifying and replacing some of the existing equipment
- · Replacing the existing picnic area including benches
- Installing a MUGA between the back of the school and the football pitch
- Installing "a Circuit" round the outside of the recreation ground
- Identifying and installing some new equipment to the north of the existing play area
- Installing sensory panels, an outdoor classroom, performance and storytelling spaces (the two sets of planners will liaise over whether some of this might already be included in the school upgrade)
- · Installing exercise equipment round "The Circuit"



We are currently considering an estimate for installing a MUGA and await an estimate for creating "The Circuit". We are revisiting costs for replacement and new equipment, and will work with the Play Park Planner to prepare the visuals for a final consultation on the replacement equipment, the new equipment and the other phases.

to Destination Anywhere. With prizes up for grabs the ever-popular Halloween Costume Competition was well supported.



A POTTED HISTORY

Helleborus niger @Andrea Jones/ Alton Albany Farm

Outside our front door at Alton Albany Farm B&B we have planted two containers of the evergreen Helleborus niger commonly known as the Christmas Rose or Black Hellebore.

Their names could be considered misleading. Their flowers are not black as their name might suggest – that comes from the colour of their roots. They are pure white with yellow stamens. They are a pretty open bowl shape, which might resemble a wild rose and suggests that's why they are nick named as such, but they are not related and are in fact part of the Buttercup family (Ranunculaceae).

What about the Christmas part of their name? Well they have flowered for us since the beginning of December through Christmas and will we hope continue for many weeks into the Spring providing our guests with a cheerful welcome as they arrive, so perhaps that is why they are called Christmas Roses.

However, there is also a more romantic legend that suggests that a plant sprouted in the snow from a young girl who had no gift to give the baby Jesus in Bethlehem.

As for the Helleborus part of the name, it is believed to have come from the Greek 'ellos/hellos', 'fawn' and 'bora', 'food' therefore meaning food for a fawn.

In the Middle Ages, the flowers were strewn on the floors of people's homes to drive out evil, animals were blessed with them and they were used to ward off witches. Allegedly witches used the herb in their spells and sorcerers powdered the plant before tossing it into the air around them to make themselves invisible - - all very Harry Potter like.



Black hellebores grow in the wild in mountainous areas of Switzerland, Germany and Italy but it was in the Phokian city of Antikyra in Ancient Greece that they became renowned and grew in great numbers.

They were used in the fifth century by Hippocrates, the Father of Medicine, as a purgative (or laxative) and according to Greek mythology introduced by Melampus who used it to cure the madness of the daughters of Proteus, the King of Argos.

Pretty as they are they are known to be quite poisonous and cause vomiting. According to one source, until the 18th century, they were responsible for the deaths of many children at the hands of their own parents. As some varieties of hellebores were used to treat worms in children, the idea being to expel the worms by vomiting. They are now known to be harmful.

If that hasn't put you off and you are interested in growing this delightful plant they conveniently thrive in semi shade and as long as they are well drained don't seem to mind the cold and wet weather that we get here in the Stinchar Valley. Best to remove any unhealthy looking leaves from time to time and also any excess when they are flowering to allow the flowers to be seen as they can hide themselves away.

They can, we're told, be propagated by seed – we're going to try that this year – wish us luck!

AN AYRSHIRE LAD

Ayrshire "lad" Bryce Cunningham needs our support in his quest to promote natural whole Ayrshire foods. With the help of his "girls" he produces non homogenised milk (milk how it used to taste!) on his farm near Mauchline. Ayrshire cows have been native to S.W. Scotland for hundreds of years and the "girls" at his West Mossgiel Farm eat from historical pastures once farmed by Robert Burns. To hear his story of producing organic Ayrshire milk and his vision for himself and other local producers, please come along to Barr Village Hall on Thursday 15th March at 7pm.

South Ayrshire Community Transport – CB8 Barr Bus Service

Our main news this issue is that we have a new timetable starting on the 12th of Feb*. Following on from local conversations and recommendations a new 5th round trip will be operated in order to give a wider range of times to be in Girvan and Barr. Gone is the need to rush around and be back on the bus within an hour or be hanging around for 4 hours. The options now include 1, 2, 3 & 4 hour+ stays. The new timetable starts a little earlier too in order to meet the 9am train to Ayr. It meets other trains to and from Ayr throughout the day, with a slightly earlier finish time. New timetables will be available nearer the time, but some copies are available from Barr Community Store and our website

To date (19th Jan) we have carried over 1100 passengers and have travelled over 10,000 miles since the service started on 1st May 2017.

Since the roadworks were started on the B734 "Screws" road on 30th October, we have on occasion had to run an altered service that delivered a midday run back to Barr from Girvan instead of the mid-morning. The roadworks are currently suspended and due to restart in February.


