New Carrick Grey Squirrel Control Officer appointment

Ayrshire Red Squirrel Group is delighted to announce that funding provided by Carrick Futures and Hadyard Hill Community Benefit Companies has enabled a new position of Carrick Grey Squirrel Control Officer to be created. The post-holder is Joram Smit, pictured.

Originally from Holland, Joram studied forestry and conservation for 3 years before moving to Scotland. He has succeeded in learning the practical parts of wildlife management and has climbed the ladder from under-gamekeeper to head gamekeeper. He has 13 years experience in wild life management on both low and high ground, throughout Scotland.

Joram is married and lives in Kirkoswald. In his spare time he enjoys salmon fishing and tying salmon flies. Joram is employed by Ayrshire Rivers Trust and is responsible for developing and implementing strategies to tackle the invasive grey squirrel population to benefit the native red squirrel strongholds of South Carrick. This will be achieved through the collaborative effort of residents, volunteers and landowners.

"How you can you help?" Join us! We rely heavily on volunteers to:

Report sightings of all red and grey squirrels - this is vitally important. Reporting your sightings of both red and grey squirrels enables Ayrshire Red Squirrel Group (ARSG) to monitor the locations of our local red squirrel populations and to pinpoint where reds are at risk. Whether you see squirrels in your garden, or when you are out and about within our area, we are very interested to hear about your sightings. Sightings are recorded on the ARSG squirrel distribution map. To record your sighting:

- Visit www.ayrshireredsquirrels.org.uk and press "What can you do?"
- Scroll down page to "sightings" and complete the "record sheet"
- Press "send" at foot of the sheet

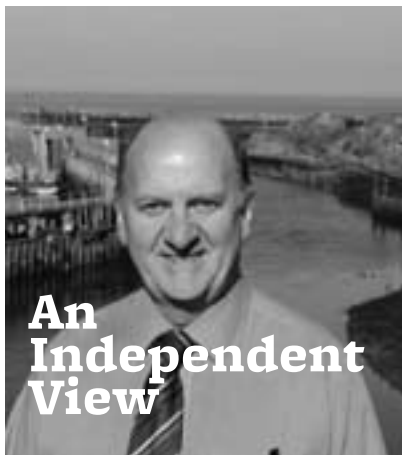

However, a lot of progress has been made within our Communities this year which shows the dedication and hard work of Community Councils and Community Groups where it is my privilege to offer support and advice when asked. Planning progress is now going forward with both the 2 Pins Centre and the Girvan and South Carrick Leisure Centre while the Bruce Trail is gathering momentum on the tourism front. A way forward is now being talked about in the not too distant future on the Carrick Way and no doubt, other initiatives will come from our local communities which will add to the melting pot out of which will come the gala days, fetes, concerts etc

St John's Episcopal Church Girvan

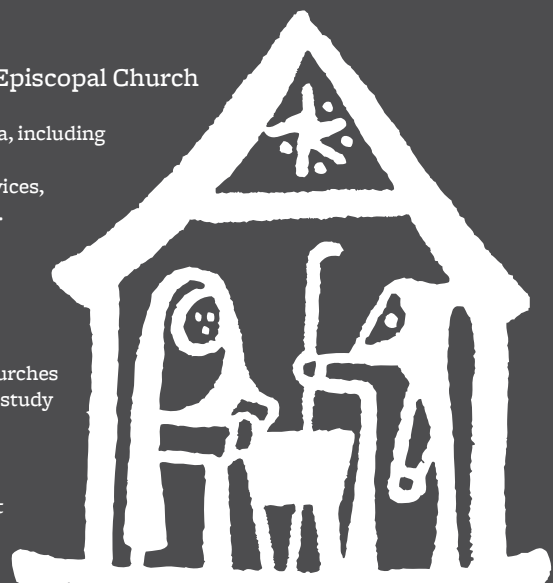
Part of the Scottish Episcopal Church

Ballantrae Church linked with St Colmon Church

When I visited Malawi in May/June 2012, the most moving and humbling experience was visiting some of the houses to inspect their mosquito nets. It is impossible to put into words how different the homes were there in comparison to our own homes. And yet in homes, where the poverty is beyond anything in this country, lived people who seemed content and who were consistently generous to us. It was good that the homes we visited had mosquito nets, however only about 55% of homes in Malawi have mosquito nets. Mosquito nets protect those sleeping underneath, often an entire family, from mosquitoes which mainly bite at night.

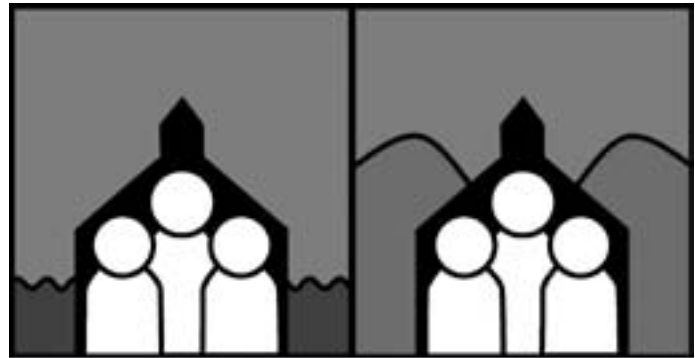
While the bite of any mosquito is annoying and itchy, many of the mosquitoes also carry the malaria virus which can be fatal if not properly treated. The initial symptoms of malaria are flu-like and include a fever, headache, sweats, chills and vomiting, which can lead to life-threatening complications. In fact Malaria is the number one cause of death in Malawi, with children under 5 and pregnant women most at risk. Therefore the value of a mosquito net cannot be over valued, because just a simple net can save many lives.

In order to help provide these much needed nets for people in Malawi, we are selling gift cards for £7, which pays for one net. You can buy these gift cards for family and friends for Christmas or any other occasion, or alternatively you can buy a card in order to support this project. Cards can be bought from myself (contact details below) or at any Church of Scotland.

For each gift card a family in Malawi will receive a life saving net and be able to sleep safely for the first time. There are not many gifts that will be given this Christmas that are life changing, but this is definitely one of them.

I hope you and the people in Malawi have a good Christmas, and always know God's blessing.

The Community Rail Partnership For Carrick & Wigtownshire

Good news for South Carrick Communities: after a hiatus of some 18 months SAYLSA has finally secured funding for its successful community rail project and will allow it to employ a part time Development Manager, reproduce its popular mini timetables and produce a range of promotional material aimed at passengers, cyclists and walkers.

Since its inception in 2007 SAYLSA has contributed to a growth in passengers 52% greater than the franchise achieved in 2002/3 to 2007/8 and an economic impact



of around £200,000 per annum. It is aiming to diversify into new markets and is already in discussion about its charter train proposal to bring visitors to the area and showcase the best Carrick and Wigtownshire has to offer. There are no train timetable alterations proposed when the winter timetable comes into effect on the 8th December. I wanted to start this column by discussing the "Elephant in the Room" - that is the future of power generation in the UK. I am well aware this is a controversial subject but feel it must be aired after the recent decision by the Scottish Government Reporter to overturn South Ayrshire Council's Planners' decision to refuse the Assel Valley development.

This decision has caused great dismay to many local residents in the Pinmore and Pinwherry area. I was equally disappointed by this decision because, like most residents, I agree South Carrick already has its share of wind farm development. Before the last Council election, I promised to speak out against any further wind farm expansion in South Carrick and to that end I have done so to the best of my limited powers.

I have also expressed my views to Fergus Ewing the Minister for Energy and Tourism and await his reply.

Over the last three years or so, I have worked with the Carrick Community Council Forum to develop a tourism strategy for Carrick and this is only now coming to fruition in the shape of the Carrick Heritage Trail and other developments.

I have no wish for this good work to be undermined by further wind farm expansion. You may have noticed the local Conservative MEP has gone to print on several occasions berating the Scottish Government and its policy on carbon free energy generation but nowhere does he address the fact that the subsidies paid to developers and landowners comes from the Westminster Conservative Government. It's easy for him to publicly complain about wind farms but no doubt he would be the first to man the barricades if a nuclear power station was proposed in the Ballantrae area or, heaven forbid, test bores for shale gas using the "Fracking Process".

All Governments have to make difficult decisions with regard to climate change and future energy supplies because we need that energy for industrial needs, the wider economy and to power the many electrical appliances we all use in our home and work places.

The other side of the coin of course are the Community Benefit Funds. Over the 25 year life span of the wind farms, local communities are given the opportunity to have real financial powers to enhance these local communities as well as employment opportunities which come from the maintenance of the wind turbines and there are other side benefits to local service providers.

As a Councillor, I have to follow clear guidelines and cannot comment on specific planning applications until they come before the Regulatory Panel, however, I very much support the development of carbon free renewable generation using off shore development of wind turbines, along with wave and tidal power technology. There is a vast potential industry with which this country can be in the forefront by providing huge employment possibilities and projects.

Finally, at this time of year, I wish everyone an enjoyable and peaceful Christmas and a prosperous New Year in 2014.

Driving On Rural Roads

There is a great deal of satisfaction to be gained from driving skillfully on our rural roads. There are also benefits too. For example, there is usually less traffic, fewer 30 mph speed limits and the great scenery of this part of South Carrick on offer.

Driving on our country roads – for example, the A714, B734, C13 and the wee roads around Ballantrae, Pinwherry, Barrhill, Barr, Lendalfoot and Colmonell can seem safer because of the lack of traffic but statistics show that drivers and passengers are more likely to die or be injured on a rural road than a busy street or motorway. Rural roads account for around three quarters of all fatal road collisions.

Don't become another statistic – follow these rural driving tips.

- Don't assume it is safe to break the speed limit on rural roads just because there is less traffic or less chance of being stopped by the police. Also, please note that the Police regularly patrol these roads, often in unmarked vehicles
- 60mph is not a target speed. Be aware that there are dangerous hazards such as blind corners, high hedges/trees, wet or icy conditions, narrow carriageways, no pavements, pot holes, animals on the road and even debris, such as fallen branches, farm waste or mud
- Pick up clues from skid marks, too. They offer a pretty clear indication that someone else has previously come to grief, so use the information and don't let the same thing happen to you
- Expect to see dogs, horses, sheep, cows and other farmyard animals. They might be on the road because they are being herded somewhere or they might have escaped making their behaviour unpredictable
- Expect wild animals. A deer, for example is a heavy animal and could cause significant damage to your vehicle. If you see warning signs for animals, take them seriously. They are there for a reason
- Be aware of pedestrians, cyclists, horse riders and quad bikes. Rural roads can be narrow and often have no pavements so anyone walking/cycling/riding along the road will be in the actual carriageway
- Think motor bike, bicycle and quad bike
- Reduce speed and drive according to the road conditions especially in bad weather
- Tractors can stop or turn without warning so stay alert. Try not to get impatient with slow-moving traffic. Restlessness can lead to accidents
- Drive slowly around bends. Drop your speed and your gears to ensure your tyres maintain grip and keep the car stable
- Be aware that overtaking will always involve driving on the 'wrong' side of the road - you may not see vehicles coming in the other direction
- Slow down when entering villages
- Look out for large vehicles such as lorries or buses. If safe to do so pull in to the verge or stop your vehicle to allow these to pass safely
- Never drive on any roads if you have been drinking alcohol or taken drugs
- Take special care when driving at night on rural roads as other drivers' headlights could temporarily blind you.
- Do not use hand-held mobile phones when driving. This will cause distraction and it is difficult to control a vehicle with one hand
- Plan sufficient time for your journey
- Make sure your vehicle is properly maintained. Tyres that are not inflated to recommended pressure can be very dangerous, especially on bad road surfaces

from the archives . . .

snippets of local history gathered from newspapers, the British Library Archives and many local sources by Keith and Christine Brown of Ballantrae.

1673 Alexander Peden, formerly a teacher at Tarbolton and latterly Minister at New Luce, declared an outlaw for being a Covenanter and is caught by Government Militia near Ballantrae. Taken to the Bass Rock and imprisoned until 1678 when he was to be deported. He persuaded the ship's Captain to let him go free and he remained an outlaw until he died in 1686.

1783 A smuggling vessel just arrived from Gottenburgh (Gothenburg Sweden?) sent a small boat with 6 hands towards the shore to appraise the country of their arrival but did not appreciate the violence of the water and two of them were drowned while the other four got ashore. Next day, the vessel landed her cargo consisting of tea and brandy which was immediately carried off by the smugglers notwithstanding that several officers of the Revenue were present but were afraid to intervene as they did not have any military support. Two troops of Scots Greys were ordered to Ayrshire to prevent smuggling in this part of Ayrshire.

1797 Tax had to be paid by those who owned clocks and watches. The following Ballantrae residents were wealthy enough to have to pay this. Hugh F Kennedy of Bennane (1 clock 1 watch), David F Kennedy of Finnarts (1 watch), Mr Donaldson, Minister (1 watch), Mr Allan (1 clock), John McKissock, Innkeeper (1 clock).

1805 The ship Peggy from Greenock on route to Liverpool loaded with salt, tar, stoneware, cheese, etc. was wrecked 3 miles north of Ballantrae. The crew of four men was saved but the cargo was almost totally lost. Lieut. Hugh Ross of the Ballantrae volunteers along with a detachment of his men prevented any of the wreck being taken away. Despite the exertions of the officers stopping the inhabitants stripping the ship, several instances were detected and locals detained. The sitting Magistrate imposed the full penalty of £5 upon two of the transgressors.

1806 A diligence (carriage) commences running on 11th March from Blair's Arms Portpatrick (7.00am) to Ayr on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays stopping at Ballantrae and arriving at the Kings Arms Ayr at 7.00pm - a journey of 12 hours.

1816 Two brothers named Coulter from Ballantrae were sent to jail for heavy penalties for smuggling gin. They had been able to elude the officers for some years past so this time the Sheriff dispatched the officers by sea aboard a revenue cutter. The officers arrived in the dead of night, landed and caught the smugglers in bed and carried them off to the cutter.

1818 John Keats and his friend & Biographer Charles A Brown visited Ballantrae while on his tour of North England and Scotland and wrote a sonnet about Ailsa Craig.

1835 Steamer Northern Yacht starts regular sailings calling at Ballantrae every Tue, Thur and Sat.

1839 James Paterson Wason was born in 1839 and died, aged 61, in Ballantrae, where he had been an Inspector of the Poor, a postmaster, and a baker. In 1881 James employed one man, two boys (apprentice bakers) and one woman. He and his wife, Jane, had nine children.

1891 According to the 1891 Census, and to his death certificate ten years later, James was, in addition, the local Registrar, Clerk to the Board School, and Clerk to the Parish Council. He had a grisly end - with gangrene in the toes of his left foot, but he had a very full life! So highly respected was he by the local community, that they erected gates in his honour at Ballantrae Cemetery. Built across the top of the gates, in wrought iron, are the words Wason Memorial Gates.

1849 An advert was placed for a resident medical practitioner for Ballantrae. The annual pay for 3 years was to be £36 per annum supplemented by employment with the Poor Law Board of at least £14 per annum. Applications were to go to the Rev Mr Milroy Minister of Ballantrae.

1853 The smack Rose, lying in Ballantrae harbour with a cargo of potatoes, was in danger due to inclement weather so the master and another man went on board to see that all was well and both fell into the water. The master managed to save himself by catching a rope and pulling himself on board but the other man John Kennedy (a Ballantrae resident) was drowned.

Scotland's National Tree: Catacol Whitebeam?

The Scottish Government is considering whether Scotland should have its own national tree, and if so, what species it should be. The iconic Scots pine is an obvious choice for this accolade but there are other candidates.

We've invited advocates for six different species to give the case for their tree. In the fourth of a series of guest blogs, Graeme Walker, Scottish Natural Heritage's Area officer for Strathclyde and Ayrshire, explains the story of one of the world's rarest trees, the Catacol whitebeam.

"The Arran whitebeam is often described as Scotland's unique tree - it has evolved and continues to survive in the mountains of Arran and nowhere else in the world. But as with most things in nature - its story is much more complicated than that! It is well known that whitebeams and rowan are prone to hybridise. Wherever two or more species grow together, there is a possibility that hybrids may be present.

Recent genetic analysis has revealed the events which gave rise to the Arran whitebeams. The story started with the crossing of the rowan and the un-common but widespread rock whitebeam. This pairing gave rise to the original Arran whitebeam. Subsequently the Arran whitebeam then crossed with the rowan which gave rise to the cut-leaved whitebeam. The next level of complexity was introduced when the cut-leaved whitebeam crossed with rowan producing the Catacol whitebeams. With only two individual Catacol whitebeam trees known in the wild this is one of the rarest species in the world.

So on Arran, we have not one, but three endemic Scottish trees, which are all part of a fascinating and uniquely Scottish tale of evolution and survival."

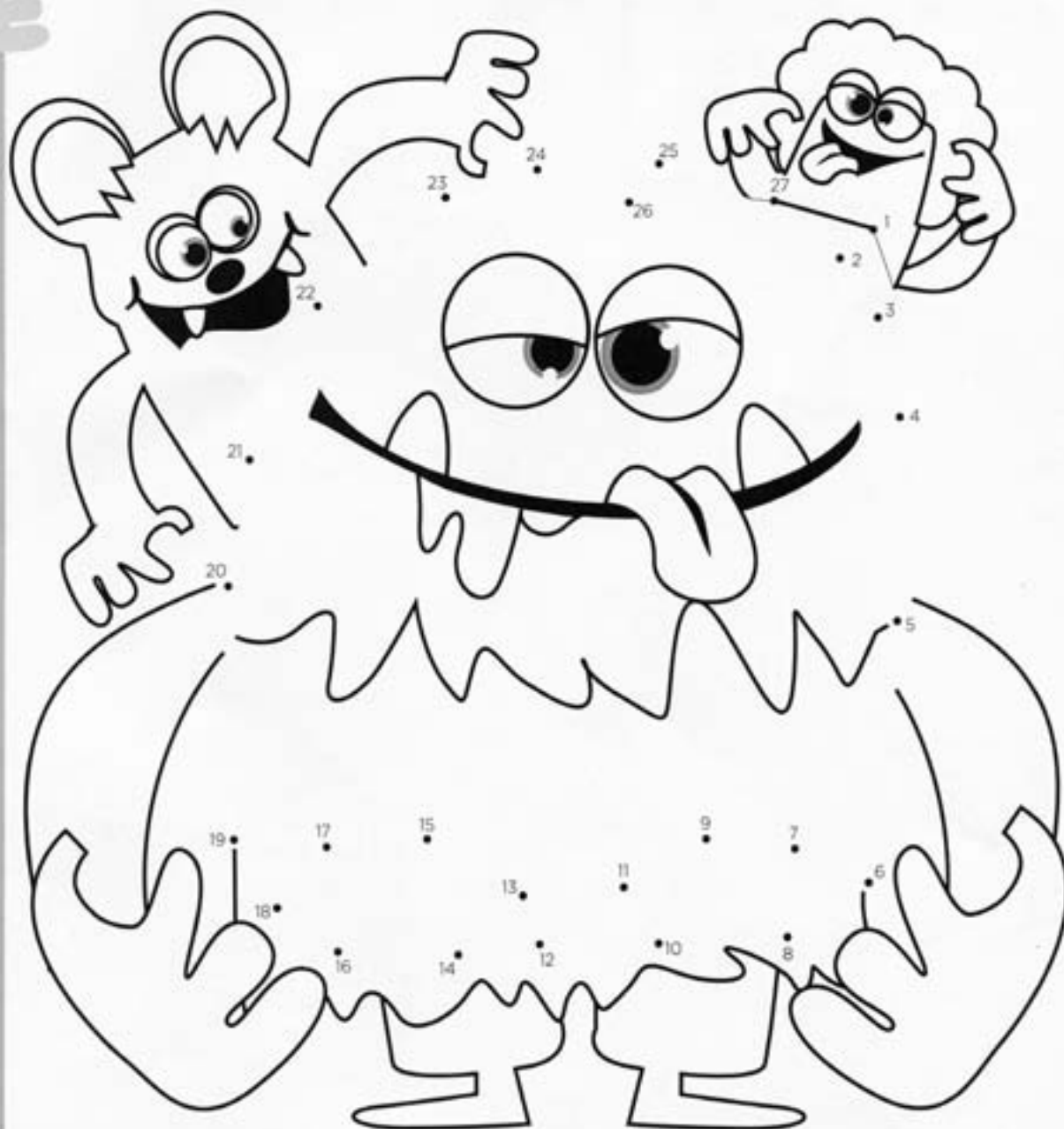

For suspicious articles found on any beach contact the police on 999 and ask for the Coast Guard because it might have come from Beaufort's Dyke; which is the sea trench between Northern Ireland and Scotland within the North Channel. The dyke is 50 km long, 3.5 km wide and 200-300 metres deep. Because of its depth and its proximity to the Cairnryan military port, it became the United Kingdom's largest offshore dump site for conventional and chemical munitions after the Second World War; in July 1945, 14,500 tons of 5-inch artillery rockets filled with phosgene were dumped in Beaufort's Dyke. Munitions have subsequently been washed up on beaches in the area. In particular, in 1995, incendiary devices were discovered on the Scottish and Northern Irish coasts.

BARR Covenanter's Stone To Be Returned To Barr



The historic 17th Century Covenanter's stone which was taken from Barr Kirkyard has been found and is to be returned.

The stone was discovered to be missing after Community Councillor, Merlin Corbett went to look at the work being undertaken to remove a dead tree and the discovery started a hunt involving South Ayrshire Council (SAC) and the Police which ended in a stonemason's yard in Patna. And, just over a week ago, South Ayrshire Council acted swiftly to recover it. No notification had been given to the village or to South Ayrshire Council that it was to be taken and, as concerns mounted, it was revealed that the stone, commemorating the death by shooting in 1685 of Covenanter Edward McKeen, had been removed, without any proper authorisation, by the Scottish Covenanters' Memorial Association. Their intention was to make a replica of it.

After a terse exchange of emails, an angry but unanimous Community Council, fired off a strongly worded letter demanding its return. This was backed up within days by swift action by SAC who recovered the stone. It is now in Masonhill Cemetery awaiting a decision on how it will be returned to Barr. Merlin said, "We were relieved when we discovered the whereabouts of the stone and are thankful for the support of and action by SAC in its recovery. However, it's unforgivable that it should have been taken from the Kirkyard without the knowledge or agreement of the village. and we continue to make that point most forcefully to those concerned."

- Aid the provision of recreational facilities which will be available to all with the object of improving the quality of village life
- Assist in the development and regeneration of the village
- Promote the education of the community about its environment, culture, history and heritage
- Take forward environmental improvement and protection issues including sustainable development and conservation.

Following up the successful Open Day at the Village Hall which was attended by a large number of residents, and using the feedback, BPDC is now working hard setting in motion a series of projects which will form an effective long term business plan for the Community. Look out for a new dedicated page which will shortly appear on the Village web site www.barrvillage.co.uk. Among the plans:

The Playpark project led by Alex Tait will receive all tenders for the equipment chosen by the children by the end of October. The drainage is being addressed with the Forestry Commission's help and funding applications will be submitted before the end of the year. Tenders will then be sought for the Multi Purpose Games Area and skatepark which will take the next stage forwards.

An Energy Clinic will be run by Alex Forsyth and Hamish Denham during the second week in November. You are encouraged to bring your energy bills and let them help you to reduce them. Notification and further details will be posted on the Web site, on Facebook and in the shop and hall notice boards.

Trail improvements and developments including simple viewpoints and benches are being sought and meetings are taking place with various bodies to work towards that aim. Negotiations and consultations led by Rachael Greuter and Merlin Currie will begin in November in order to research and prepare for funding applications in the New Year towards a blue route mountain biking trail.

The Carrick Heritage Trail with Merlin Currie & Anett Forsyth is well on the way and the sun dial will have the first stage complete by the end of November. The artwork will link to the trails and lead to further creative connections on the walking routes later in 2014.

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Pilgrim Trails Developer To Put Scotland's Case In Innsbruck

Penelope Denu, Director of the Council of Europe's Institute of Cultural Routes, has invited James Brown, innovator of the Ayrshire Pilgrims' Trail, to promote the case for pilgrimage to Whithorn (The St Ninian Ways), as a proposed European Cultural Route, to a high-level European audience at the Council's annual Cultural Routes Forum at Innsbruck, Austria, in November.

There are about 30 officially-recognised European cultural routes but none focused on the UK, and yet several have direct relevance to Scotland. For Carrick, the foremost is the Network of Cluniac Sites of which Crossraguel Abbey is one. Apart from making the Forum aware of The St Ninian Ways and its related theme of Scottish migration in Europe, James will be seeking potential collaborative partners - there are eleven countries to choose from - for future trans-national funding bids. James said, "The scope for developing high-quality cultural tourism in Ayrshire is enormous. As just one example of how a Carrick community could participate is the re-establishing of Ballantrae's St Ninian's Fair as an annual event."

The right to hold this Fair was granted by James V whose father James IV made many pilgrimages to Whithorn. Often these were through Carrick and, in July, 1507 the king visited Bargany on the 13th, en route to Whithorn, and Ardstinchar on his return seven days later. Prior to the bridge being built at Ardstinchar, pilgrims would have been required to cross the Stinchar by ford, presumably at Heronsford, as nearby are the ruins of Kirkcudbright-Innertig, the church of St Cuthbert at the mouth of the [Water of] Tig, which was described in 1617 as altogether ruinous and decayed since the Reformation of 1560. Other sites in the vicinity which suggest the one-time presence of chapels are Kilphin, Kilwhannel and Kilmoray.



An interesting papal document from 28th August, 1467 shows the value placed on devotion to Ninian and on the faithful donating money to the protection of the buildings at Kilantringan (church of St Ninian). It states that :

"To all Christ's faithful who shall see these presents. Relaxation of five years and five quarantines of enjoined penance to all who, being penitent and having confessed, visit on the feasts of St. Ninian [16th September] and the Nativity of St. John Baptist, from the first to the second vespers, the chapel of St. Ninian in the parish of Calmanal near the castle of Ardstruchar (Ardstinchar) in the diocese of Glasgow, and give alms for the conservation of its buildings and the better supply of its books, chalices and other ecclesiastical ornaments, etc."

Welcome to August's Security Newsletter: Windows XP

This month we focus on client security and the security implications of running software that is no longer supported by the manufacturer. If you have been following Microsoft security news recently, you are likely aware that support for Windows XP ends on April 8, 2014. Please note that after this date, customers running Windows XP will no longer receive new security updates, non-security hotfixes, free or paid assisted support options, or online technical updates. This means that any new vulnerabilities discovered in Windows XP after its "end of life" will not be addressed by new security updates from Microsoft.

From a security perspective, if you are running Windows XP, I cannot stress enough the importance of migrating to a newer platform that is supported and can provide increased protections. The very first month that Windows XP goes out of support, attackers will have the advantage. The first month that security updates for supported versions of Windows are released, attackers will reverse engineer those updates, find the vulnerabilities, and test Windows XP to see if it shares those vulnerabilities. If it does, attackers will attempt to develop exploit code that can take advantage of those vulnerabilities on Windows XP. Since security updates will no longer be available for Windows XP to address such vulnerabilities, Windows XP will essentially have a "zero day" vulnerability forever. I discuss this in greater detail in a recent blog post.

This should be concerning for anyone using Windows XP today. If your organization has not started the migration to a modern operating system, it is crucial that you begin planning and application compatibility testing as soon as possible. Based on historical customer deployment data, the average enterprise deployment can take 18 to 32 months from business case through full deployment. If you are looking for resources on how to get started, I encourage you to read the Windows Blog post on "365 Days Remaining Until XP End Of Support. Fear Of Bugging Prompts Ipad Ban in Uk Cabinet Meetings

iPads were plucked from users' hands at a UK Cabinet meeting last week, because of fears that they might be bugged by foreign intelligence agencies. The Daily Mail on Sunday reported that the Ministers were using the devices for a presentation by Cabinet Office Minister Francis Maude and Mike Bracken, who's in charge of the Government Digital Service. The talk was on the topic of saving the economy close to £2 billion (\$3.19 billion) a year within the next four years. Typically, the Cabinet isn't particularly generous about applause for presentations, the Daily Mail said, but this time, when the talk wrapped up, Ministers clapped. That's when the government's security team pounced, the Mail reports, whisking all iPads out of the room to avoid careless talk reaching the wrong ears.



It doesn't stop there, The Telegraph subsequently reported. Given the security force's fear that foreign intelligence agencies have developed the ability to turn mobile devices into eavesdropping bugs without their owners' knowledge, all tablet computers - which, one assumes, covers all manufacturers' gadgets, and not just Apple's - are now banned from Cabinet meetings. The Telegraph's Matthew Holehouse writes that Ministers in sensitive government departments have also been given soundproof, lead-lined boxes that they're required to store their mobile phones in while having sensitive conversations.

The concern, he writes, is that China, Russia, Iran and Pakistan have developed the ability to turn mobiles into microphones and turn them into transmitters even when they are turned off. The news comes fast on the heels of reports last week from Italian newspapers (including La Stampa) that delegates to the G20 summit near St. Petersburg, Russia, received USB sticks and mobile phone chargers boobytrapped with Trojan horse malware. The devices reportedly were able to secretly tap emails, text messages and telephone calls. According to Corriere della Sera, when he got back to Brussels, the G2 European Council President, Herman Van Rompuy, sent the devices over to his security managers.

They in turn asked for help from the German secret service. Their analysis resulted in a memo going out to member states indicating that the USB stick and power cables were "suitable for the illegal collection of data from computers and cell phones" and that member states should "take every possible precaution in case these items have been used and if not to entrust the security structures for further inspection." Russia has denied the allegations. What are the lessons here for businesses? Typically, most don't struggle with the fear of a nation turning their employees' devices into surveillance bugs. But with or without the threat of foreign intelligence spying on your organisation, iPads, or any other tablet for that matter, are in many ways just smartphones in a bigger form. That means they carry the same risks to a company's network security. Such devices also usher in the bring-your-own-device migraine.

Practical tips in these surveillance-happy times

The traditional, centralised approach of configuration management, software, patching and security is often impossible, if not irrelevant, on such platforms, as Sophos's Ross McKerchar has described in his article about handling smartphones in the workplace. That article has tons of good advice on handling device security, including segregating a user's personal iPad or other device so that they don't have direct, unrestricted connectivity to crucial servers unless absolutely necessary; having clear policies on passwords and jailbreaking; evaluating the risk profiles of platforms (Android vs. Apple); educating users; and more.

But wait, there's more!

Ross followed up with this article, which delves into what an attacker might do with the juicy tidbits on a stolen or lost device. This includes the social engineering stunts that can be pulled, given that the device would likely contain the owner's address, date of birth and information that could then help to answer account security questions.

Still worried about your mobile phone being a bug? Advice for the truly surveillance nervous: Before you read either article, lock your cellphone in your car trunk. Don't read the articles out loud, and try to avoid moving your lips while you read. <http://nakedsecurity.sophos.com>

I'm writing in regards to a free dog microchipping campaign I am trying to organise across Scotland.
I work for Dogs Trust, you may have heard of us. We're a large dog welfare charity with 18 rehoming centres across the UK, two of which are in Scotland (Glasgow and West Calder). There has recently been a change in law and by 2016 all dogs in England and Wales will have to be microchipped. We are expecting Scotland to follow suit and as a result are running a large campaign to support councils and communities in preparation for this. There are a number of benefits to microchipping dogs, most obviously that should they go missing they can be reunited with their owners quickly. It also promotes responsible ownership by way of making owners accountable for their animals.

Our campaign involves a team of two roaming vet nurses who will attend events/locations across Scotland and microchip dogs for free. We also pay for the advertising so there are no costs to anyone else. We simply ask for a piece of space. Can I ask if it would be possible to hire a suitable space in the Pinwherry Community Centre to run a microchipping event? We would normally do this outside in a 3m x 3m gazebo but as this would have to occur in January onwards (we are booked up until then) it would be more ideal for our nurses to be inside. It would be great if we could come to your area as part of the campaign.

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Ballantrae's First Smugglers' Festival

There was conspiracy afoot in Ballantrae in August as dubious characters were spotted in doorways, behind wheelie bins and lurking in gardens... the smugglers were about!

Over the weekend Saturday and Sunday 17/18 August "Smuggler scarecrows" started to appear and by Monday afternoon, over 40 could be seen around the village.

On the Wednesday the Judge and the Exciseman gathered together local and visiting children, swore them in as members of "The Excise" and sought their help to scour the village following a "Smugglers' Trail".

On the Wednesday evening Frances Wilkins, a social historian and author told "Ballantrae's Smuggling Story" to an audience of adults and children in "The Smugglers' Arms" - the Community Hall had been transformed for the festival. Frances described the contents of her new book telling the story of the village's smuggling history. Her talk was well received. Copies of her book sold well on the night and copies are still available from Craigmains Home and Garden Centre price £7.50.

On the Thursday evening the "Secret Smugglers Film Night" featured "Whisky Galore" the true story of a Scottish coastal village smuggling whisky. Elsewhere in The Smugglers Arms" Raphael Marinoni from the Whisky Experience hosted a whisky tasting evening.

But while everyone was relaxing on the Thursday, the Exciseman and Judge had been busy tracking down the rogues trading contraband in the community. Those who had been apprehended were brought to trial during a very

participative "Court of Justice" on the Friday evening - which was a sell-out. The defendants were called to account, and, while defending themselves, they implicated the minister and a local doctor in their activities. Stephen Ogston and Dr Tom Smith played their parts well! The hand-picked jury of locals and visitors were regarded by the judge as far too lenient and the jury was eventually dismissed by the judge - who at times it has to be said, seemed to be distracted by the widow Bell who (it is alleged) ran a house of ill repute in the village. The Judge had his own idea of who was guilty and what the punishment should be! Guilty verdicts were delivered. Most of the smugglers and collaborators were sentenced to the wet sponges in the stocks but one unfortunate smuggler was sentenced to be hanged because he had killed an Exciseman. The aim was to encourage tourism, support local businesses and offer a unique event for the village and surrounding communities and fundraising opportunities for local community groups.

Andy McAlpine convenor of the Smugglers' Festival Organising Group said:

"The Festival far exceeded our expectations. We were delighted with the number of Smugglers Scarecrows created and by the way the local community and visitors really supported the week's events. Denis Reid (The Judge) and Davie Hunter (The Exciseman) put in a huge amount of work - not only during the event, but also in the lead up to it - developing story lines and crucially, engaging with the primary school children. They really helped to make the festival come alive."

"I want to make special mention of the primary school children and Yvonne Templeton the Head Teacher at Ballantrae and Colmonell. The looks on the faces of the children made it all worthwhile!"

"But lots of others played their part. The Ballantrae Development Group would like to thank everyone who helped to make Ballantrae's first Smugglers' Festival a success no matter what your contribution was. The dates of next year's festival are Monday 18 to Saturday 23 August. Put the dates in your new diary now! We plan to build on the success of this year - some things we'll repeat but we'll also do some new things. And yes - we will have a few surprises in store! We look forward to seeing you then....."
